## HISTORICAL SOCIETY ACQUIRES "SLAYTON" BOAT

Thanks to the generous donation from the Arnie Onken family, the museum is now home to one of the few boats made in Slayton during the 1950's. In 1956, "Limited Products, Inc." was established by local business leaders and boats were the first industry they brought to town. Art Olson became the technical head of the company with Mel Risting as President and A.D. Weck as Sec./Treas. Factory space was found at the former Andy Herdman Motors on south Hwy. 59. Fifty boats had been sold by

March 1957 and fifty were completed and in storage. Demand exceeded production and expansion was needed. In Sept. 1957 the operation was recapitalized and name "Slayton Boat Industries". This entity was incorporated in Jan. 1958 with O.E. Klasse-Pres., V.K. Buckles-V.P., and A.D. Weck-sec./treas. Marlow Samp was now the director. The Slayton boat industry came to a crashing end on March 18, 1959 when a fire started and within an hour the entire factory was destroyed. Initial estimates put the loss at nearly \$100,000. Dr. R.F. Pierson, one of the officers, owned the building. The boat firm had been struggling but prospects looked better for the next year as an order for 30 fishing boats had been received that morning.

Due to stockholders unwilling to invest more funds the boat factory met an untimely death.

Thanks to the Arnie Onken family for this wonderful donation of a piece of Slayton history that many don't know existed.

## GRANT AWARDED TO HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The Minnesota Historical Society has awarded the Murray County Historical Society a \$2000 Historical and Cultural Program grant to help preserve our hard copy newspaper collection. We do have most newspapers on microfilm but have many hard copy newspapers stored on shelves in our newspaper room. The early copies are not bound into hard cover books and

have been secured with flimsy cardboard and tied up with twine string which has begun to crumble the edges, which happens with age but the string is not good for it.

With this grant money one hundred deep lid buffered boxes have been purchased along with unbuffered acid free tissue paper to put between the papers to help preserve the copies. With these archival boxes the newspaper room will be more user friendly and in better order if hard copy newspapers are needed for research. Sometimes the microfilm copies are dark or don't copy well and that is when we turn to the hard copy newspapers. We are very grateful for this grant.

## 1910 ARTICLE FROM THE LAKE WILSON PILOT

Why are you not blowing your horn harder for Clarence Dinehart?, was asked us the other day by a friend. The main reason is because just at present we don't believe he needs it. We have lived with Clarence Dinehart for more than twenty years, and although he was born with a silver spoon not once did he show it either in work or in deed. Whether in overalls

hauling hay or hobnobbing with the powers at the capitol he has always been the same courteous, affable gentleman that he is today. Mr. Dinehart is known by the people who have lived with him as a clean, capable, intelligent young man and to hear him classed as a man of Cannon's stripe is to laugh. No man is better fitted through educational and business training to

represent this district in congress than Mr. Dinehart of Slayton. *L.W. Pilot 1910* Clarence was the son of Christopher and Flora Dinehart and was state treasurer at the time he was running for Congress. He died this same year of a ruptured appendix and his funeral was held out of the Dinehart/Holt House with Governor Eberhart in attendance.
