



I like the Garvey quote above, but in our case, we would probably say 'prairie grass without roots.' It is true, historians are always trying to make the case that history is important. In Murray County we know that people take their history seriously. This isn't just local history, its personal history. There are so many people who contact us looking for history about their ancestors, or someone stops in to see Uncle Harry's artifacts that he donated in 1963. Maybe someone is looking for a repository for their great grandmother's wedding dress. The local museum tries to help them all. In 2018 the museum received requests for research from over 60 different researchers. We accessioned items into the collection from 77 donors. Items ranged from a single 1897 sale bond for the District 23 Schoolhouse to three five-drawer filing cabinets full from the Bill Bolin Collection. We also took in ten bankers boxes of documents and photos from the C.E. Dinehart family; 2,200 items in all. With all of these items to care for, I am glad we have two well organized staff members to give this collection order and care. We also deaccessioned some items that no longer fit into the collection, are a hazard, or are duplicates. Some of those have gone back to the families who donated them, some have been offered to other museums, and some are waiting for final dispersal upon due process.

We hit a milestone this year. We accepted our first digital age artifact; the first computer to be used at the Murray County Wheel Herald. Boy do I feel old!

In 2019, Collections Manager Rose Schmit and End O Line Site Manager Jakob Etrheim will be spending extra hours doing an inventory of the agricultural items in the Sierk Building. Their project is paid for with an Arts and Cultural Heritage grant provided through the Minnesota Historical Society and made possible by the people of Minnesota from the 2008 Legacy Amendment.

### A Note from Rose

A Look into Rose's Winter Schedule

What a busy winter this has been so far! The 2018 Victorian Christmas hosted at the Dinehart Holt House has kept me on my toes with cleaning the house, setting up the trees, decorating, and now, after about four months, taking the decorations down and organizing for next year (thank you to our wonderful volunteers with their help on all these tasks). We had a large turnout for both the Victorian Christmas Open House and the Volunteer Open House which could not have had a better setting than the beautiful Dinehart Holt House.

One exciting project I have been working on has been organizing and creating what I'm going to call a "Simple Inventory/Finding Aid" on the Dinehart Holt records which were donated this winter by Margaret (Holt) Lichty, a descendant of the Holt family. Lichty donated the contents of 10 full banker boxes of everything from pictures to passports. So far with eight boxes completely sorted there are roughly 2,200 documents accounted for in this new collection! It has been so fun every day digging into the records and seeing all the wonderful new information we have not only on the Dinehart Holt family but also on other Murray County families and businesses!

Another major project that I have been working on this winter is the Collections Committee (CC) meeting. With the changes in staffing, we have not had a CC meeting in quite some time and so at this meeting we'll be reviewing donations from over <u>35 donors!</u> With approval by the CC, I will be able to start accessioning the new donations and getting them settled into our permanent collection.

In terms of grant work, Jakob and I have just gotten started on working on the Sierk Inventory Grant. Through this process we will get every item in the Sierk Building officially on PastPerfect, the cataloguing program we use here at both the museum and out at End-o-Line. Also, with Janet's guidance, this winter I wrote my first grant ever! The grant money would be used to purchase several books about museum work including cataloguing, exhibit building, interpretation, and much more. This grant will not be reviewed for a while, but we have our fingers crossed for its approval!

Finally, the last major venture I have been working on this winter is the designing and building of a storage shelf to be used for all the framed art in the collection. At this time, the framed art is stored in several different locations in our storage rooms. With the completion of this new shelf, the framed art will be checked to verify that it has been catalogued, wrapped in protective acid-free tissue paper, and stored together as one large collection.

Overall, it has been a busy and exciting winter here at the museum! I am looking forward to the spring to see what new adventures and projects await!

### **Ingenuity on Display**

The Museum has so many amazing items on display that often things are overlooked by our visitors. Every artifact tells a story and these items tell about human ingenuity through the centuries.



This Native -made technology is a full -grooved stone axe head. These were pecked using another harder stone and then smoothed on sandstone. As they became dull they were re-sharpened again. They were hafted onto a strong wooden handle. This axe was found on the property of Fritz and Phyllis Bloemendaal of Lowville Township who donated the piece in 2018. This tool was probably used over 2,000 years ago.



In 1893 Christian Christianson of Hadley, slipped and got his legs caught in a threshing machine. Both legs had to be amputated. Not to be kept an invalid, Christian fashioned this handmade artificial leg. He used a hands free cane that he fashioned for the other side and went about his business for another 32 years, dying just short of his 100th birthday.



Before the area sprouted hardware stores and manufactured items, early sportsmen created their own fishing equipment and hunting decoys. This little ice fishing decoy was hand made by Ole Aleckson of Skandia Township. Ole came to the area in 1877 and was an ancestor of Case Vos. It is perfectly balanced and was used for spearing. The decoy was donated by Ole's daughter, Mary Lindsey, who lived into her 90's.



Slayton machinist, Jim Meaden's, award winning three cylinder rotary motor won best of show in the 1973 Minnesota Inventor's Congress. It was similar in design to the German Wankel engine having reciprocating pistons. Jim, a decorated WWII veteran, took over Meaden Machine Works from his Dad, Otto, in 1972..

### **Happenings for the End-O-Line Site Coordinator**

People always ask what I do while End-O-Line Park is closed for the winter. My quick response is usually along the lines of: I work on projects I don't have time to do during the summer! But here is what I have been doing and some of my plans for the winter.



My first project immediately after the park closed for the season was to research and design interpretive panels for the park. If you haven't been to the park recently, a couple years ago we restructured our guided tours of the park. Instead of the tour consisting of every building on campus and the tours taking 90-100 minutes long, now our guided-tours take you through only our railroad-themed buildings, structures and exhibits. The other buildings (that we call our "Village") that have a local county history theme are now open for visitors to tour on their own. The one downside to this tour change is that the non-tour buildings don't have any history or interpretation. So, we developed panels with pictures and history that will accompany each building so visitors can learn the history and significance in each building.

This fall and winter, I have also been going through our attendance numbers, guest book submissions, and visitors' surveys to determine who how many visitors we had at End-O-Line as well as where they are from, what times/day are the most popular visited times, and any criticism they left. Despite being closed for three weeks in July due to flooding, attendance was good in 2018 with 3,512 visitors from nearly 20 different states. 10:30am on Saturdays was our busiest tour times.

For the remaining winter and spring, I'll be on working scheduling school field trips in May and restocking the gift shop. Until early April, I will also be working with Rose to inventory the collections that are in the Sierk building thanks to a grant from the Minnesota Historical Society's Legacy Amendment. We estimate there is about 800-1000 individual items in there, so it will be good to have a concise record of everything in the building. Finally, I will also be starting the process of looking for a structural engineer or architect to give an assessment of our historic 1901 turntable at the park. Last year's flooding has us worried about its condition.

As I approach my second full summer at End-O-Line park, I want to thank everyone for their encouragement and support. And please give End-O-Line a visit in 2019. Whether the last time you visited was last year or 30 years
